The year continues to absolutely fly by and Term 3 holidays are already upon us. For our seniors in Years 11-13 these holidays are not holidays but “study breaks”. Te wiki o te reo Māori was followed by Te wiki o te Taha Māori and has ended the term on a really positive note, particularly for our Rangipō whānau. Rangipō students were in 9 roopu and worked on their art boards, making hīnaki and learning about fishing for tuna and their importance to Ngāti Manawa, sewing face masks for our kuia and koroua, weaving, making poi and learning to perform with the poi, designing certificates and gift bags, building stilts, and building a pataka kai. On the pataka kai, when painted this will be at the front of the school and when we have excess fruit, vegetables, or herbs they will be placed into the pataka kai and anyone who would like them will be free to take them for their whānau. Feel free to contribute any excess food you may have as well to support our community. These activities all have a strong focus on our uara of; whānaungatanga, manaakitanga, akoranga, tiakitanga, whakapono, tūmanako, and kotahitanga. We know you will start to see these more visible around the school, on the walls, in the korero with your tamariki, and in the actions of all our taurua.

On Friday Rangipō students will participate in an Amazing Race with clues in Māori related to Ngāti Manawa.



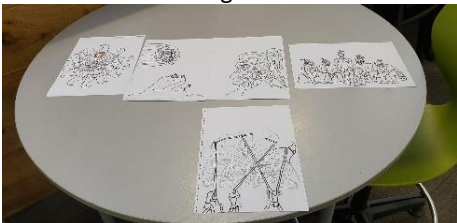
