Year 1- 10 Reports are beginning to be sent home with your children. Senior reports will be sent out within their fortnightly cycle on Wednesday 23 June. Next week we will have our Tauira Whakamura day where our tauira will share their learning with you. These student-led conferences are a conversation between the student, their parents/whānau, and their teacher. Students share their learning progress and achievement and will show you selected pieces of work in their e-portfolio or learning journal. It is a conversation about what the students are learning at school rather than what they are doing at school. Your role is to listen to your child, ask questions and encourage the student to expand and explain information further. The role of the teacher is to facilitate and lead the conversation about the student's learning and prompt the student when needed. The role of the student is to share their learning with their whānau and reflect on the progress they have made so far this year.

Tauira Whakamura aims to:

- help our students show their whānau what they have been learning
- teach our students how to reflect and evaluate their own learning
- develop our students' organisational and oral communication skills and increase their self-confidence
- encourage students, whānau, and teachers to engage in open and honest dialogue about the learning
- encourage students to take personal responsibility for their own learning
- increase your understanding and work together to support your child's learning.

We look forward to meeting you all on Thursday next week and sharing your child's learning with you.



Protect against measles

If you are aged 15 to 30 you may not be protected against measles. Measles is a serious disease that can make you very sick. It's even more contagious than COVID-19 so it spreads fast.

Getting immunised is the best way to protect against measles – it's easy and it's free.

When you immunise against measles, you don't just protect yourself. You also protect your whānau, your community, and future generations from harm.

All students from Year 9-13 will get a consent form to bring home. Those 16 years and over can consent for themselves but those under 16 need parental/caregiver consent Please return consent forms to the Office as soon as possible. Vaccinations will be offered at school in August and we need to know the numbers who would like to take up the offer of vaccination so we can plan and set a specific day.

Well done to the following students:


Manawai-Tia Sillick 1st place Boys 11 year old age group and also coming in 3rd overall across all age groups. With a time of 16.54.
