SERVICE ACADEMY BUSH TRIP

Kia ora koutou katoa,

By now, whanau should have received a 'settling in' report for their child. This report gives you an idea of how your tauira has started their year at Murupara Area School. If you have not received your report please contact the school and we will re issue the report.

We are also really worried about the number of children who have not returned to school and the negative effect COVID disruption is having on the learning of our tauira. We want to support the community as much as possible so we have decided to have a 'What's up whānau?' event next week. On Tuesday and Wednesday between 3pm and 5pm staff will meet with the whānau of every child in their homeroom or learning advisory. This meeting may be by phone, online hui, or kanohi ki te kanohi. Teachers have already started contacting whanau to figure out a time and contact method that best suits. This is an important meeting so we can talk about your child's learning and especially their engagement after yet another COVID disruption. What can the teacher, student, whānau, and school do to support your child? What is important - what's up - for your child and your whānau? How will we work together?

A further important issue that we wish to bring to the attention of the whanau is that tauira should not be engaged in paid work or enrolled in other institutions during school hours. This is not called 'work experience' as some have been claiming it to be. Anything of this nature can be clarified with Deputy Principal Mrs Kura Hingston and myself as Principal. However, the school through the Ministry of Education has processes in place whereby tauira can apply for trades or Gateway placements to further their interest in an appropriate careers pathway. Mrs Teri Teddy is in charge of this area and she is more than willing to meet and discuss this with you.

The latest figures for COVID cases in the Murupara district show that we have probably hit our peak and cases are declining so lets get the focus back on the learning and the future pathways of our tamariki and rangatahi.

We want Murupara Area school to be a centre of excellence for your child and a place that you are proud to call 'your school'.





I am Jessika and I am the new public health nurse for the Kura. I am employed by Community Health for Kids. I will be writing a short blurb in the fortnightly newsletter to keep whanau informed about the latest updates in healthcare.

My role is to support our tamariki and whanau in the kura to ensure all their health needs are being met. I am wanting to work alongside whanau to support them in the best way that suits their needs, advocating for them in the health sector.

There has been some confusion on whether it is safe for students to come to school during the covid-19 pandemic. Te Tahuhu o te Matauranga (The ministry of education) has deemed that it is

recommended to come to school for most students. There are some students who may have special consideration to do home learning during this time and that is if the student or a

whanau member is at higher risk. It is best to talk to your GP when making this decision. Schools follow strict guidelines to ensure the spread of covid-19 is kept to a minimum. Regular hand washing, mask wearing, and physical distancing should still be practiced when applicable outside of school as covid-19 is prevalent in the community.

We have had a separate health warning regarding measles epidemics in 10 countries in the world. As New Zealand is opening its borders shortly, health experts are predicting a measles outbreak in New Zealand this year. As covid has interfered with other appointments and things have slipped through the cracks, this is just a friendly reminder to parents to get their children immunised against measles, if they are due to do so.




SPORTS NOTICEBOARD

NĪOREORE PĀNUI






