IMPORTANT ANNOUNCEMENT—PPTA STRIKE

You may have heard through the media that, Area schools and Secondary schools PPTA teachers are involved in **light** strike action. At first the idea of any strike action being "**light**" seems unusual but what it means for us at Murupara Area School is that teachers in Rangipo who are PPTA union members are **not able to provide relief cover during their non contacts**. A non-contact is a period of time when teachers are not physically teaching a class but are involved in administrative teaching duties. This applies at school and at any off-school sites. An example of this recently was the cancellation of Rangipo Senior Camp as staff were not able to supervise tamariki outside of their timetabled hours. So far, we have been able to schedule teachers so that any disruption is minimised and our tamariki are not missing out on their learning



This is a heads up To let you all know that the teaching staff at Murupara Area School will be on STRIKE THURSDAY 16TH MARCH. As a result, staff will not be available to teach your tamariki. Please make arrangements to supervise your tamariki. Our DP Julie Tumarae has made contact with all whanau of the under 14 yr old students who may require supervision. To date no one does. Our students display a great love for the water and have much confidence in all areas. Recently we have been able to get outside and work on our ball skills and also have had a recent Professional Development meeting with our BOP Sports Coordinator who has introduced us to many fun games that are also beneficial to our health and well being. KĀRANGARANGA PĀNUI


Here we safely arrived at the marae, full of excitement and ready to survive our Noho Marae 2023.

Response to Text—The Sea Devil by Shazayviah Sharp, year 10

The story "The Sea Devil" by Author Gordon is about a time where a man goes fishing at night for mullet in a Florida lagoon, only to find out he caught a certain kind of ray, known as a Sea Devil or Manta Ray.

My personal opinion on 'The Sea Devil' was that I thought it was interesting with all the different kinds of plots that were happening; it felt intriguing, yet challenging when reading. I felt like I was in his position, imagining what it would have felt like if I were in the fisherman's shoes.

The main idea or 'plot' of this story was about a solitary man fishing alone at night for mullet, unexpectedly catching the "monster" of the lagoon, the Sea Devil, a Mobula Birostris and the lone man fighting for his life, to get out of that life or death situation...






RANGIPŌ -Athletics & Swimming Sports

Rheumatic Fever Prevention Notice

Kia ora,

It has been brought to our attention that we have some misunderstandings with GROUP A STREPTOCOCCUS (STREP THROAT) and what the process is.

- Throat swabs are done on a weekly basis in Schools by me & Adrianna Jenner. Those schools are Te Kura Kaupapa Motuhake o Tawhiuau, Kaingaroa Forest School, Galatea School, Te Kura o Huiarau, Murupara Area School, Minginui & Te Whaiti Schools.
- 2) Swabs are then processed & sent off to ROTORUA PATHLAB, from the Murupara Medical Centre.
- 3) Wait for results (With the results, we DO NOT receive the results back straight away! It takes 2-3 days to get the results back. (Sometimes longer, depending on how busy the PATHLAB is.
- 4) Contact Parents to advise them that their child or children have tested positive for STREP THROAT. Parents are also advised to ring the Murupara Medical Centre or the Murupara Health & Gift Shop to find out when the medicine will be ready for pick up.
- 5) With a positive case, we take the form to the Murupara Medical Centre for them to dispute the MEDICATION! We do not hold any MEDICATION nor do we PRECRIBE the MEDICINE!
- 6) Children must stay home until they receive their medicine.
- 7) Once the medicine has been received, the child is required to take all the Antibiotics for 10 days. The child can RETURN to school once the first course of Antibiotics has been taken for 24 hours.
- 8) Prevention is the key: *Always wash your hands *Don't share food or drinks *Always cover your mouth when you cough or sneeze!

I hope the information I have shared with you, will give you all a better understanding of the process of how we work around Rheumatic Fever & STREP THROAT.
