How full on has our first term been for us here in Nīoreore and Karangaranga. We have welcomed in almost 20 new students, who have just fit in like they were always here. We had our first noho marae for the year at Tipapa and learned the pūrakau of Te Hekenga a Tangiharuru. Our kaupapa ako has been focused around Te Tiriti o Waitangi and the importance this document holds for us.

This has been followed by lots of rich discussions and learning based around ANZAC and the history of our koroua and kuia who have been a part of any of the NZ armed forces. We are a health promoting school and to keep this classification we must ensure that our students have as little 'sugar' content as possible. Our school lunches are designed by nutritionists and with encouragement the students learn to eat healthy. We have daily fruit available and breakfast of milk and weetbix and at times other food supplied to us on this programme by Kids Can - it would be a shame to lose this.

Petra Club & Tu Taniwha



From the Art Room

What a fabulous term it has been in the art room. The Year 7 and 8's are delightful; completing the 'Reptile Ripples' unit, exploring the art work of Michael Tuffery and Maori and Aboriginal pattern, completing their assignment with an acrylic painting using warm coloured patterned textured background and a cold coloured reptile in the foreground. For the final two weeks of term we are working with clay, moulding pots. When they are dry, near the end of term two we



hope to do a rakau firing in the ground to cure them. I haven't done this for twenty years so if anyone in the community can help with the process please let me know; your help will be appreciated.





The Year 9/10s have been working with a similar theme but their exploration work focussed more on interior pattern of the meeting house at Tipapa Marae and of course, the magnificent landscape of the Te Ika Whenua Range visible from Kopuriki Road.



Year 11's are diligently working to complete their first unit of work which reflects two places of cultural significance to them. One of the places was Tipapa Marae, again, the motivation coming from the Marae noho at the start of the term. Interestingly, for the second cultural context some have chosen their room at home, a Marae, dreams they have had and special places meaningful to them from within the outdoors of the rohe. This is the first year teaching and learning the 'new standards' from the curriculum.

Year 12"s are using landscape as the context for their work. Some artist models studied are Colin McCahon, Shane Cotton, John Bevan Ford and of course, Maori carvers and painters whose work features in Marae.

Year 13's have a lot of work ahead of them to complete the three panel folio board due in Term Four.

Services Academy - term 1 2024. Wow! What a journey it has been for our tauira both from our Murupara Area School and also Huiarau, they've come into it whole-heartedly, right from the get go, with the attitude to do their best and do what it takes to aid in their own growth, in saying that they love the credits associated also.



Our goal was to get everyone through the Waiouru Induction Course which is the most challenging aspect of the Services Academy. We broke down the Induction Course into three key elements, Parade, physical fitness and team building activities. These elements are a solid base to becoming leaders and were also the fundamentals of our teachings throughout term 1. Although they are words on a paper, the challenges that these elements bring pushes our kids well and truly outside of their comfort zones, which is a testament to their aroha, whanaungatanga, kaitiakitanga, perseverance, commitment, resilience and their respect for not only each other but all academies/staff present. Throughout Induction everyone had what I call "minties moments" or personal challenges caused by the pressure or nature of the military environment. A lot of individual self-reflection was addressed and mentored by myself, as to what was the purpose of each individual being at induction. After taking time to chill, reflect, reassess and reset, each and every student humbled themselves and found it within themselves to get back up and carry on. Because its not about what's happened to make us feel down or annoyed but how we each individually find the strength to get back up and carry on stronger and better than before as a test and the trial and tribulations are a true method of building character and resilience.
