Greetings everyone, welcome back to our final term of the year. This is a particularly busy for the Seniors as they complete portfolios, assessments and ready themselves for NCEA exams. After this week, we have approximately just under 5 weeks of learning left! This term brings with it a number of school camps and end of year activities that we are gearing up for. Year 11 to 13 camp at Ohope begins on the 25th of November and the Year 9 and 10 Camp begins on the 2nd of December. This annual two day programme is always a fun way to finish a busy year of learning, so keep an eye out for more information as it is shared with the students. Thanks to our whanau who are able to attend and support these events. Keep your calendars clear. Rest assured that quality teaching and learning is still very much the focus each week. There is still a lot to achieve and share with the students as we build into our prize givings and celebrations at the end of the year.

On a less positive note, sadly the school has been informed of changes to the Regional Tertiary Commuter bus service that currently operates between Murupara and Rotorua Tertiary-Route -104 The Regional Council has made the difficult decision to stop these services at the end of 2024. Despite recent increases in passenger numbers, overall use remains low, with an average of 4 -6 passengers per trip. In addition, financial support from NZTA Waka Kotahi and tertiary providers has not been secured for 2025. Without this support, Regional Council cannot bridge the substantial annual shortfall of \$277,654 without impacting other public transport services. Students who are planning to use these services in 2025, will need to plan ahead for alternative transport.

We had the pleasure of having Whaea Courtney-Anne who is completing her Teaching Degree Practicum under the guidance of Whaea Suzannah. We were very pleased to have her in her home environment and the children responded well.

CROCS are not allowed to be worn at school and will be taken off the students who continue to break this uniform rule. They will be held until a parent comes up to collect them.

As the weather warms up it is essential that the students have enough good quality sleep to allow them to complete a full day of learning. At age 5 they should be in bed by 7pm to allow them to grow and rest.

We are a health promoting school and because of this status we receive fruit daily from the national program and Kidscan sponsored good food including weetbix and milk. In order to keep this we are obliged to police the lunchboxes and lately have noticed the huge increase in sweet, sugary, unhealthy snack food. A child does not need oreo cookies, twisties, jellies, chips, milkdrinks, fruitbars laden with sugar, chocolate bars and many other unhealthy, tooth destroying items for lunch. They can choose one item but the rest will be sent home. A single sandwich with a simple filling to their taste is more than adequate when we have fruit and breakfast cereal always available.

This term our major study is around Fires of the Earth so anything you can talk to them about at home will be helpful. Volcanoes capture the imagination of young children, possibly talk to them or take them to see the geysers and geothermal activity at Waiotapu, or Craters of the Moon just before Taupo. Talk to them about their whakapapa, their personal maunga. Lastly please help your tamaiti remember to bring back their class reader everyday so they are able to participate in instructional reading.

Extra big emphasis on attendance and learning this last term to prepare them to move on up the levels next year.
